Renfroe named Pelahatchie's new library director

Brenna Renfroe was named library director for Pelahatchie, a town she knows well. She is the 2019 salutatorian of Pelahatchie High School (PHS). She also attended East Rankin for elementary and middle school.

"I will always be a proud Chief, because I had some amazing teachers, plus my mom, who encouraged me to grow and gave me the tools I needed to succeed," Renfroe said.

"Being a librarian, you could say, is in my blood," she said. Her mother, Eles Renfroe, is the librarian at Pelahatchie High School where she has been for the last sixteen years. "Libraries and books have always been my safe space. I want to cultivate that safe space for others."

Renfroe grew up with a fierce love of reading. "My mom read aloud to me

when I was very young. One of my earliest memories of falling in love with a book was when I was maybe five or six, and my mom read a chapter of The Hobbit aloud to me and my sister each night. It took me to magical, awe-inspiring places, and I have loved books ever since."

"Collaborating with Brenna to build a high school book club feels like coming full circle," Eles Renfroe said "We love books, and we love sharing our joy of reading with people. The Pelahatchie reading community is in good hands with the Renfroes."

Mara Polk, Central Mississippi Regional Library System (CMRLS) Director, said, "Ms. Renfroe is energetic and eager to serve the community of Pelahatchie. CMRLS looks forward to her contributions to Pelahatchie and the field of librarianship."

Renfroe said that her goal in the Pela-


Branch Manager, Brenna Renfroe shares her thoughts:


With her background in English, a minor in history, and even a stint working for Walt Disney World through their college program, Brenna is bringing a dynamic mix of knowledge and creativity to the library.

City Beat: Mayor, Alderman meeting for February 3, 2025

The Pelahatchie Board of Aldermen held its regular monthly meeting on Monday, March 3, 2025, at Town Hall. Mayor Karl Vanhorn called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m., followed by the invocation and

Pledge of Allegiance.

New Business:

The board approved the minutes from the previous meeting held on February 3, 2025. Alderman Jones made the motion, Alderman Harrell seconded it, and the motion passed with all in favor except Alderman Harvey.

The board voted to approve the payment of the unpaid claims docket, with Alderman Warren making the motion and Alderman Jones seconding it. The motion passed with all in favor.

The board approved a bank draft payment to Morgan and White Insurance for \$971.27. Alderman Jones made the motion, Alderman Hill seconded it, and the motion passed unanimously.

A payment of \$8,293.24 to Blue Cross Blue Shield Insurance was approved, with Alderman Harrell making the motion and Alderman Jones seconding it. The motion passed with all in favor.

The board also approved a payment of \$5,916.31 to EMC Property Insurance. Alderman Jones made the motion, Alderman Harrell seconded it, and the motion passed unanimously.

Additionally, the board approved the February 2025 payroll, which included \$72,526.23 from the Gener-



al Fund and \$26,913.84 from the Enterprise Fund. Alderman Jones made the motion, Alderman Harrell seconded it, and the motion passed with all in favor.

Department Discussions:

Pelahatchie Police Chief Robert Mahaffey requested a reimbursement of \$150. Alderman Jones made the motion, Alderman Hill seconded it, and the motion passed with all in favor.

There were no reports from the maintenance, clerk,

or zoning departments.

Executive Session:

A motion was made by Alderman Jones and seconded by Alderman Hill for the board to enter an executive session at 6:07 p.m. to address personnel matters within the Police Department and Election

Commission. Details of the discussions were not disclosed. The board returned to the meeting room at 6:18 p.m.

Discussions:

Mayor Vanhorn announced that three town public hearings were scheduled for the following day. (Editor's note: Due to weather conditions, these hearings have been rescheduled to Monday, March 31, 2025.)

Alderman Jones thanked the town for the new asphalt that had recently been poured.

Mayor Vanhorn also noted that only four months remained in the town's current administration and emphasized that no agreements would be binding on the next administration after July 1, 2025.

The meeting adjourned at 6:32 p.m. The next regular board meeting is set for Monday, April 7, 2025, at Town Hall. Residents are encouraged to attend and participate in local governance. Additionally, the three public hearings will be held at Town Hall on Monday, March 31, 2025.

Brenna Lintner-Davis, representing Southern Pine Electric, participated in the Youth Leadership Workshop in Jackson and ranked in the top 10 candidates.





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

The life of pine needles: two stages and turning colors

We all know leaves turn color during the fall. This is because chlorophyll, which is the green pigment that gives leaves their

green color, breaks down and disappears from the leaves. Yellow and orange pigments, which were once hidden, are now visible. Trees like hickories, oaks, birches, sycamores and cottonwoods turn brilliant shades of yellow and orange.

What about pine trees? We remember the Fall and Winter of 2023, when so many pine trees died because of the drought, pine beetles, or both.

However, every year we rake or buy pine straw to put in our flower beds. Now we see a few dead needles on pine trees turning brown in September and October. The life cycle of needles on our pine trees is a little more complicated than our broadleaf deciduous trees.



Each fall, I get phone calls from concerned tree owners about why their pine trees are turning brown. We hope it is not pine beetles again. To understand what is going on, we need to know a little about the life cycle of needles on our pine trees.

Each needle on a pine tree lives roughly one and a half years. Each

spring when the tree begins to grow new tissue, they add new needles to the ends of each tree branch, roughly doubling the number of needles on a pine tree. These new needles are stuck out on the ends of branches, out beyond the old needles. The tree uses both the old and new needles during the growing season. Then, in the fall, the pine tree reabsorbs the nutrients from the old needles only and then the pine tree drops the old needles. This is noticeable in late September and October, as the portion of each turf of needles closest to the trunk turns brown. The new needles, those that were newly grown the previous spring, stay on the tree all through the winter. In the spring, a new batch of needles will be grown on the ends of the branches and the cycle begins all over again.

So, in the summer, pines have two ages of needles, one set a few months old (located on the ends of each branch), and another 15-18 months old (located on the trunk end of each branch), each doing photosynthesis. In the

each doing photosynthesis. In the winer, all needles are the same agethe older needles being dropped the previous fall.

Also, our pines do not go into dormancy. Any time the conditions are right, the tree will absorb sunlight just like it does in the spring.

Pastor's Perspective: The greatest gift of love is for anyone

John 3:16 is without question considered to be the most popular, most widely known, most read, most memorized verse in the Bible. It can be seen driving down the highway on billboards, and also

at sporting events, on posters or on the eye black of players. If you ever visit an In-and-Out Burger, the most famous fast-food restaurant on the west coast, you can find the reference "John 3:16" printed on the bottom rim of every one of their drink cups. The magazine Christianity Today reported from research done in the year 2022 that John 3:16 is by far the most widely Google searched Bible verse each month. The magazine acquired Google search data from 172 countries around the world and looked at the average monthly volume of Google searches for the 100 most read Bible verses. John 3:16 had 2.1 million searches. followed by Jeremiah 29:11 and Philippians 4:13 in a joint second at just 82,000. So, that begs the question: "Why does this verse get so much attention?" To help answer that question, the great reformer Martin Luther once referred to John 3:16 as "the heart of the Bible, the Gospel in miniature."

John 3:16, as much as any one verse in the Bible, declares the Good News of the Gospel. Jesus' most



famous words are: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him, should not perish, but have eternal life." The Greatest Gift ever given is without question God the Father's gift of love to the world in the person of God the Son, Jesus Christ. The reason Jesus is the greatest gift is because only He is uniquely able to be the solution to mankind's greatest problem, which is our sin against God. Sin causes us to be separated from God (Isaiah 59:2) and in the path of His wrath against sin itself Romans 2:5). Jesus is able to be the solution because He is both God and man. Being fully God and fully man enables Him to be the perfect lamb without blemish, to be sacrificed for our sins. He absorbed the wrath of God's punishment so that we are able to escape. You hear terms like 'salvation' and 'being

saved' when you think about the Gospel. This is why! We are literally saved from the penalty and punishment by God upon sin. The only One who didn't deserve the wrath of God is the One who endured the wrath of God so that we can escape the wrath of God, but not only so we can escape, so that we can inherit eternal life with God. This is the Greatest Gift. But it is only the Greatest Gift for those that actually receive the Gift.

Jesus said that this gift is given to the world and that anyone who believes is saved. Anyone! So, what does it mean to believe? Just before the words of John 3:16 were said, Jesus said in verse

3: "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." Jesus was saying we need a new life. Our lives are marked by sin and shame. Being born again and receiving this new life comes through believing upon Jesus to save you. Based upon the whole of Scripture, believing means recognizing your sin before God, turning away from that sin, and putting every ounce of your hope in Jesus and what He did on the cross to save you from your deserved punishment of the wrath of God. We believe in Him and we believe upon Him. Jesus did for us what we could not do for ourselves. It is truly a gift, but that gift can only be received by turning from our sin and turning to God through believing in Jesus and what He did for you. Have you received this priceless gift?
