


contagious, inspiring students to embrace their own educational journeys.

# City Beat: Mayor, Alderman meeting for August 5, 2024

The Pelahatchie town meeting on Monday, August 5, began at 6:00 P.M., with Mayor Karl VanHorn calling the meeting to order. Alderman Eddie Jones led the invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Mayor VanHorn then conducted the roll call, confirming the

attendance of Alderwoman Diane Hill, Alderwoman Sandra Harvey, Alderwoman Margie Warren, Alderman Eddie Jones, and Alderman James Harrell.

### Residents and Visitors' Business:

The meeting began with Waggoner Engineering's Hayden Overby, Project Manager, and discussed the potential extension of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) obligation deadline until December. The board discussed, considered and voted on the proposal.

### Department Discussions:

The board briefly reviewed reports from the Police, Maintenance, Clerk, and Zoning departments.

During the police department's discussion, the focus was on drafting a new ordinance to ban the operation of ATVs on streets and public roads within city limits. The police chief and the city attorney agreed to collaborate on drafting the ordinance, which will be presented for a vote at next month's meeting.

### New Business:

The board swiftly addressed the following items under new business:

- 1. Approval of Previous Meeting Minutes (July 1, 2024): A motion was made, seconded, and carried to approve the minutes from the previous meeting.
- 2. Approval of Payment of Unpaid Claims Docket: The board discussed and approved the payment of the unpaid claims docket.
- 3. Approval of Disbursement to Morgan and White



Insurance (\$5,616.33): The motion to approve this disbursement was passed without opposition.

- 4. Approval of Bank Draft Payment to Blue Cross Insurance (\$9,140.89):\*\* The board voted in favor of the bank draft payment.
- 5. Approval of Bank Draft Payment to EMC Insurance (\$6,536.27): The board approved this payment for property insurance.
- 6. Approval and Ratification of July 2024 Payroll: The board approved and ratified July's payroll, totaling

\$71,127.72 from the General Fund and \$25,105.54 from the Enterprise Fund. The motion passed.

### Alderman Discussions:

Alderwoman Diane Hill: No comments or discussion items.

Alderwoman Sandra Harvey: Raised questions about expenditures from the general fund and the Muscadine Jubilee fund, which were addressed to her satisfaction. She had no further comments.

Alderwoman Margie Warren: No comments or discussion items.

Alderman Eddie Jones: Emphasized the importance of storm preparedness in light of Hurricane Debby, which became a Category 1 hurricane on August 4. Though the storm ultimately missed our town and our state, Alderman Jones highlighted the need for preventative planning and urged residents to be vigilant about being prepared for any potential severe weather and the condition of trees that could pose a risk during severe weather.

Alderman James Harrell: No discussion items were presented.

### Mayor's Comments:

Mayor Karl VanHorn reported multiple complaints about vehicles—cars, trucks, and SUVs—being parked on public streets and blocking driveways, which is a violation of city ordinances. He and the police chief agreed to increase enforcement of this and other ordinance violations.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

At just 10 years old, Brody Yarborough is making quite a name for himself in the world of baking. Specializing in sourdough bread and cinnamon rolls, Brody has already built a budding business that is delighting the taste buds of his local community. Brody's Bread is the name of his business. We talked with Brody to learn more about his passion, his process, and his plans for the future.

Brody's journey into baking began in an unexpected place: YouTube. "I saw a video on YouTube," he says, describing the initial spark that ignited his interest. From there, it was his grandmother, affectionately known as Mimi, who nurtured his budding passion. "My Mimi taught me how to bake," Brody recalls fondly.

What started as a fun activity quickly turned into a serious pursuit. "I enjoyed the fun," Brody says, but it was clear he had a knack for it. Now, his baking routine is methodical and precise. "We have three starters that we feed every four to seven days. Then we make the dough and let it rise. After that, we roll out the cinnamon, cut them to size, and let them rise again."

When asked about his favorite part of baking, Brody's eyes light up. "The

fun," he says without hesitation. But there's more to it than just enjoyment. Brody reveals that his secret ingredient is "an abundance of love." This love is evident in every batch, especially in the specialty rolls he's been experimenting with. "We add things we like. We are making specialty rolls, birthday cakes, homegrown and handpicked blueberries, and cookies and cream."

Balancing his baking business with his education might seem challenging, but Brody manages it well. "I work around my homeschooling to get things done," he explains. Initially, he even hired his big brother to help clean the kitchen. "Now the whole family is involved with the volume I make," he adds.

Brody sells his cinnamon rolls at Down Right Southern, his family's store, and at the local Farmer's Market each month. Pricing and other business decisions are a family affair. "Momma helps with that part," he says.

Running a business at such a young age is not without its challenges. "Working every day" is the toughest part, according to Brody. However, seeing the positive response from his customers makes it all worthwhile. "That everyone is loving what I am doing," he says proudly, is his greatest achievement so far. And when things don't go as planned? "Start over," he advises simply.

Looking ahead, Brody has big dreams. "Growing the business and becoming the Mayor of Pelahatchie, and opening a restaurant and having a food truck," he shares with a smile. For now, he's enjoying the journey. "Making the money and making the dough," he says, summing up his dual love for baking and business.

Despite his busy schedule, Brody still finds time for fun. "I still play tennis, ride dirt bikes, and play games with my

uncle," he says. His advice for other young aspiring entrepreneurs? "Just do it and don't be scared."

When asked who he'd most like to bake for, Brody chooses a close-to-home hero: "My neighbor David." And when it comes to his favorite non-baked food? "Potato soup with bacon bits," he confesses.

Brody Yarborough's story is a testament to what passion, family support, and a little bit of fun can achieve. With his talent and determination, the future looks bright for this young baker and his delicious creations.

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


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# Saluting our veteran employees: Tedra Sirmon

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# The caterpillar vs. the oakleaf PHS Band prepares for new year

Some years, usually about this time of the year, we begin seeing defoliation of oak trees. Variable Oakleaf Caterpillars are common on oaks and other hard-

woods throughout the state, but especially in the northern part of the state. Normally, their populations are kept in check by a variety of beneficial insects and diseases, including tiny wasps that parasitize their eggs. But during outbreak years these caterpillars can cause severe, and complete defoliation of oaks and other hardwoods. These caterpillars have two generations per year in the south, and second-generation caterpillars may cause additional defoliation of trees in other locations. As the name suggests, variable oakleaf caterpillars vary considerably in color, but the dark 'sideburns" on either side of the head capsule are good identification clues. Few other caterpillars have these. Mature caterpillars are about 1.5 inches long.

Controlling these caterpillars is usually impractical on large landscape trees because 1) trees are too big to spray, 2) the risk of off target spray drift is too great, and 3) most of the damage

has already been done by the time infestation is noticed and the infestation has almost run its course. Fortunately, healthy hardwood trees usually recover, even from being completely defoliated, without suffering serious long-term injury. Keeping trees watered during periods of drought will aid in recovery. Insecticides containing Spinosad (Fertilome, Green Light, Bonide, Monterey, and a few others sell homeowner formulations, and Conserve is for commercial applicators), or chlorantraniliprole ( Acelepryn for commercial applicators) can be sued to control caterpillars on small or high value trees in cases where such applications are practical.
