

# Pelahatchie Ends Dry Spell: Liquor Ordinance Approved

Pelahatchie is stepping into a new chapter as it becomes the latest town in Rankin County to open its doors to liquor stores. In a de-

cision that has been brewing for more than two years, the Pelahatchie Board of Aldermen voted 4-1 to approve an ordinance allowing liquor stores within city limits. This move brings Pelahatchie in line with its neighboring communities and aims to keep both residents and revenue local.

The ordinance, which was not initially on the monthly meeting agenda, surfaced at the end of the town board meeting on Tuesday, September 3, 2024, and passed after a brief but decisive vote. While most board members favored the change, Alderwoman Sandra Harvey remained opposed.

Mayor Karl VanHorn stated at the board meeting that anyone interested in opening a liquor store in Pela-

hatchie's city limits could find all the information they needed in the ordinance itself. He stated that if anyone is interested in opening a liquor store in the Pelahatchie city limits,

they will have to both apply through the state of Mississippi for a liquor license and the Pelahatchie Board of Alderman for a business license and for location approval.

The ordinance does contain strict zoning regulations that limit where liquor stores can be placed. No corner stores, grocery stores, or gas stations will see alcohol sales; only standalone buildings will be allowed to sell spirits.

This development comes in response to residents' growing demand for local

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access to alcohol. For years, many had traveled to nearby towns like Jackson, Brandon, and Flowood to make their purchases. With the new ordinance, the town hopes to capture this lost business, keeping dollars spent on liquor within Pelahatchie's borders. The ordinance also puts the town on the map as a destination for future businesses interested in setting up shop, with all necessary licenses and approvals handled by both the state and local authorities.

The approval of Pelahatchie's liquor ordinance brings both advantages and challenges. On the positive side, local businesses stand to benefit as residents will no longer need to travel out of town to purchase alcohol. This keeps revenue circulating within the community, potentially boosting the local economy. Moreover, the ordinance's strict zoning regulations ensure that liquor stores are controlled and strategically located, preventing over-saturation in residential areas or near schools. On the downside, however, some residents may be concerned about the possible social effects, including an increase in alcohol-related issues such as public disturbances or impaired driving.

As Pelahatchie prepares for this next step, the hope is that the town will benefit from both the economic boost and the convenience it offers its residents. Whether this change brings more prosperity or presents unforeseen challenges, one thing is clear-Pelahatchie is ready to raise a glass to its future.

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
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Before using any

pesticide on any edible crop, one of the most important things you need to know is

the preharvest interval or PHI. This is how long you need to wait after you spray the crop before you can harvest the crop. If the product is labeled for use on an edible crop, this information is stated on the product label. For some products on some crops the wait is very short-spray up to the day of harvest. For other products on other crops the wait can be as much as 21 days, or even longer.

The PHI's for a given product can be different for different crops. It depends on what crop is being sprayed. For example, Hi-Yield Indoor/Outdoor Broad Use insecticide (permethrin) has a 0-day PHI on tomatoes, 1-day PHI on lettuce, 3-Day PHI on peppers, 7-day PHI on potatoes, and a 14 day PHI on blueberries.

A lot of times Zeta-Cypermethrin is a good choice for a home garden

insecticide because it controls most major garden insects, and it has a 1-day PHI on most garden vegetables. Bifenthrin may be a bit more effective on some pests, but it has a 7-day PHI on peppers and a 3-day PHI on squash. If you have leaf footed bugs feeding on the tomatoes and peppers and squash bugs on the zucchini, it is helpful to know you can spray them all at the same time and be able to pick all three crops at the same time or a day or two later.

However, there are some pests, such as aphids, spider mites, and whiteflies, that zeta-cypermethrin will not control. Also, there are some crops, such as onions and sweet corn, for which the PHI for zeta-cypermethrin is longer than one day. Always be sure to check the label before you spray.

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





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## City Beat: Mayor, Alderman meeting for September 23, 2024

The Pelahatchie Mayor and Board of Aldermen held their regular meeting on Tuesday, September 3, 2024 at 6:00 P.M. at Town Hall. Mayor Karl VanHorn called the meeting to

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order, with Alderman Eddie Jones leading the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance. All board members were present, including Al-

derwoman Diane Hill, Alderwoman Sandra Harvey, Alderwoman Margie Warren, Alderman Eddie Jones, and Alderman James Harrell.

#### **Residents and Visitors' Business:**

Although Burt Dupree of Heslep Street was scheduled to speak, he did not attend the meeting. **Department Discussions:** 

Reports from the Police, Maintenance, Clerk, and Zoning departments were briefly mentioned, but there were no major updates. The police chief was not present for the meeting.

#### **New Business:**

1. Approval of the minutes from the August 5, 2024, regular board meeting. Alderwoman Warren made a motion to approve. Alderman Jones seconded. The motion passed with all in favor. 2. Approval of the minutes from a special board

meeting held on Tuesday, August 27, 2024. (Editor's Note: At this special meeting, the board granted St. Luke's Church a conditional use permit, allowing them to expand their property with the addition of a new cemetery and approved the town's 2024 budget. The budget is now available for public viewing at both Pelahatchie City Hall and the Pelahatchie Police Department). Alder-



man Jones made a motion to approve, and Alderwoman Warren seconded the motion. The motion passed with all in favor.

3. Approval of the unpaid claims docket. Alderman Jones made a motion to approve, and Alderwoman Warren seconded the motion. All voted aye, except Alderwomen Harvey and Hill. The motion passed, 3-2.

4. Approval of a \$989.20 payment to Morgan and White Insurance. Alderwoman Warren made a motion to approve, and Alderwoman Hill seconded the motion. The motion passed with all in favor. 5. Approval of an \$8,017.57 payment to Blue Cross Insurance. Alderman Jones made a motion to approve, and Alderwoman Warren seconded the motion. The motion passed with all in favor. 6. Approval of a \$6,536.27 payment to EMC Insurance for the town's property coverage. Alderwoman Warren made a motion to approve, and Alderman Jones seconded the motion. The motion passed with all in favor.

7. Approval and ratification of the August 2024 payroll, including \$63,603.29 from the General Fund and \$24,664.98 from the Enterprise Fund. Alderman Jones made a motion to approve, and Alderwoman Warren seconded the motion. The motion passed 3-2.

#### **Liquor Ordinance:**

Mayor VanHorn asked for a motion to amend the meeting agenda to allow for the board to vote on an ordinance that would allow liquor sales in the town of Pelahatchie. Alderman Jones then made a motion to allow amendment of the meeting agenda, and it was seconded by Alderwoman Warren. The ordinance was then voted on and passed 4-1, with Alderwoman Harvey being the only opposing vote. In the ordinance, Mayor VanHorn said that special zoning rules will apply to the town's new liquor ordinance, limiting where liquor stores can





#### Severe allergy season expected due to temperatures, increased rainfall

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As Mississippi residents eagerly anticipate the arrival of fall, allergy sufferers should prepare for a challenging fall allergy season. Compared to last year, increased allergens are expected due to rising temperatures and higher rainfall.

The combination of warmer temperatures and increased rainfall provides an ideal environment for plants like ragweed to thrive and multiply over longer periods. This results in larger quantities of pollen being released into the air in the fall. This pollen can travel long distances and affect those with asthma and allergies in Mississippi. Mississippi Asthma & Allergy Clinics across the state are preparing for the season by offering immunotherapy treatments and educating patients on managing their allergy triggers.

"While the severe drought in 2023 caused significant problems for many in our state, it did reduce the growth of plants that produce fall pollen," said Dr. Joshua Fowler, physician at the Starkville lo-



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cation of the Mississippi Asthma & Allergy Clinic. "In contrast, the surplus of rainfall in 2024 is likely to make fall allergies more prevalent this year."

Now with eight locations throughout the state, including two new clinics in McComb and Starkville this year, Mississippi Asthma & Allergy aims to assist all Mississippi residents suffering from asthma and allergies through personalized treatment plans, helping them return to enjoying life without the worry of allergies and asthma.

"Our clinics see a significant increase in patients during this time of year," said Dr. Patricia Stewart, physician at the Jackson location of the Mississippi Asthma & Allergy Clinic. "Ragweed pollen is a major trigger for fall allergies and asthma, and we aim to provide our patients with quality care along with valuable information on associated symptoms and prevention."



# Pastor's Perspective: Daily Mercies for Daily Trouble

When I was a teenager and into my 20's, I loved going to the Mississippi State Fair. I couldn't wait for those weeks in October

each year. While I still enjoy going, the inspiration for going has changed dramatically. In my younger years, I loved all the exciting rides. To be certain, in my mid-40's I'm much more interested in the free biscuit or check-

ing out the newest deep fried whatever. But 25-30 years ago, it was the Pirate Ship, the Kamikaze, the Gravitron, and my personal favorite, The Super Himalaya. However, one day, I remember Melanie and I taking our 4 kids (all under the age of 10 at the time) to a park with just a simple playground. My oldest son, Caleb, wanted to ride the merry-goround, and so of course, I spun him around as fast as I could. After he had some fun, he wanted to spin me. I thought, sure, that'll be fun! After all, the Super Himalaya is my favorite ride at the fair! He spun me for a few seconds and then I begged to get off. As I exited the merry-go-round, I stumbled this way and that and may have even hit the ground before eventually making it to a park bench, where




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I laid down until my body and head somewhat recalibrated. It really wasn't until the next day that I felt "normal" again. It was that moment that I realized my body had entered a new season of life and wasn't prepared to spin that quickly anymore!

While I don't enjoy spinning at high velocity anymore, sometimes life spins me around quicker than I'd like. Perhaps for you, the better metaphor is a roller coaster with high peaks and deep valleys. Regardless, as much as we'd like for it to, life doesn't always keep us on a smooth and straightforward path. Life can be bumpy. It can spin us into dizziness. It can even knock us down.

Lamentations is a fascinating book in the Bible. As the title projects, the book includes the laments of the prophet Jeremiah as the people of God began to experience the long-warned punishment from God for their consistent disobedience. It is not a chipper read. However, right in the middle of Jeremiah's gloomy laments is this shocking burst of light: "But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness." There's much to unpack from these verses, but one thing I'd like to communicate to you is that God is not surprised when life throws you and I into the spin cycle. He is all-knowing and sovereign. Therefore, when He promises to provide daily mercies for us that are new each morning, the promise here is that those daily mercies are sufficient for each day's specific trouble or challenge. We can depend on them to be enough for us because He knows exactly what we're going through. But also notice this: Jeremiah called this promise to his mind intentionally as he was in the middle of the trouble. It was an intentional decision for him to believe God for the mercies he needed each day.

Therefore, my challenge for me and you today is to be mindful of the faithfulness of God. That He is all-knowing and all-sufficient and supremely generous in that He provides exactly what we need to walk through whatever we encounter, even when we're in the spin cycle. When the darkness is overbearing and the challenges seemingly unbearable, call to mind God's steadfast love and believe Him for the mercies you need to carry you through.


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# East Rankin seniors selected to all-star cheer team


