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Local Menasha Packaging expansion in Pelahatchie complete

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Kraus-Anderson Construction has completed an expansion of a packaging manufacturing facility for Menasha Corporation located in the Pelahatchie Industrial Park at 108 Industrial Drive just east of Jackson, Mississippi. Menasha Packaging, a business group of Neenah, Wisconsin-based Menasha Corporation, offers high-graphic displays, boxes and other shipping containers for consumer project companies. Designed by Excel Engineering, the 89,856-square-foot expansion features an interior remodel of the mezzanine, restrooms, breakroom, stair tower and a new 9,274-square-foot office space. The project also added a new 100-stall parking lot, truck loading docks and fire lane. Construction began in April 2023.

Retail-focused packaging and merchandising solutions provider Menasha Packaging announced in 2022 that it was expanding its operations in the US with a new investment in Pelahatchie, Mississippi. As part of the project, the company has invested \$79 mil-

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lion to expand its existing manufacturing facility in Pelahatchie Industrial Park. Menasha Packaging also acquired more machinery and equipment. Menasha Packaging Company president Mike Riegsecker said: 'We are excited about our expansion into Pelahatchie and the cultural fit that exists with the team here.

"We are committed to investing not only in the facil-

ity but also in this great team and in the community. We appreciate the assistance provided by the state, county and city in helping us solidify our long-term commitment to Pelahatchie."

Meanwhile, the Mississippi Development Authority (MDA), Rankin County and the city of Pelahatchie have also supported Menasha Packaging with the project.

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MSU extension service: southern magnolia

Nothing describes the Southern magnolia better than its scientific name, Magnolia grandiflora. The flowers certainly are grand!

Magnolia trees display their creamy white flowers in late spring through summer, and you certainly can't miss the cup-shaped blooms that reach up to 8 inches in diameter. Flower petals are thick and waxy and have a lemony fragrance.

After bloom, the flowers are replaced with cone-like seed pods. When these pods ripen, the large, red seeds are pushed out and add to the beauty of this tree. These woody, brown pods with bright red seeds also can be used in dried floral arrangements.

The Southern magnolia can grow at a moderate rate to a height of 80 feet or more with a 30- to 40-foot spread. These trees form a dense, dark green pyramidal shape in the landscape.

Southern magnolia is native to the bottomlands and moist, wooded areas of the central and southeastern coastal plains. They prefer rich soil with partial shade and, in nature, are usually understory trees. The Southern magnolia tolerates high moisture levels but not overly wet or swampy soils and prolonged flooding.

When grown as an ornamental, it is best to maintain the heavy-leaved limbs

of the magnolia almost to the ground. Doing so will provide a place for the


dropped leaves and seed pods to hide out of the way of mowing.

ERA Boys MAIS 5A State Runner-up and Girls Highest Finish in 20 Years

East Rankin Academy (ERA) Patriot Track & Field team concluded the 2024 season on Saturday, May 4th at the 2023 Midsouth Association of Independent Schools ("MAIS") State Championship.

Entering the post season with both varsity teams MAIS 5A District 2 Champions, twenty athletes individually and all eight relay teams qualified to the regional North State Championship at Bayou Academy. The Patriots at North State were very successful, the varsity boys coming away as the North State Championship runner-up.

Among the thirteen individuals (some in multiple events) and seven relay teams that qualified to the 2024 State Championship were senior, Liam Wilkerson (400 meter dash); junior, Lydia Collipp (400 meter dash), and senior, Brayden Warner (discus), all North State champions in their respective events.

Multiple gold medalists included senior, Brayden Warner, winning his second individual state title in discus with a throw of 172-10; senior, Liam Wilkerson, winning the 400 meter dash in a personal best time of 50.58; the boys 4x200 relay team, consisting of junior, Aiden Harrell, senior, Liam Wilkerson, sophomore, Taylor Woods, and freshman Jon Riemann, breaking the ERA school record with a time of 1:30.32; and a very young boys 4x800 relay team featuring 8th grader, Walker Sartin, sophomore, RT Tate, freshman, Jon Riemann, and 8th grader, Zack Price, demolishing the school record with a winning time of 8:46.91.





Hardy Crape Myrtles and the new threat of Bark Scale

Crape Myrtles are one of the most popular landscape plants in the South. Traditionally crape myrtles have been free of serious disease and insect pests, but that situation changed with the arrival of Crape Myrtle Bark Scale(CMBS).

CMBS is a serious new threat to southern crape myrtles. It threatens to turn what has historically been a beautiful, low-maintenance landscape tree into an unsightly, high-maintenance landscape tree. The nonnative scale was first detected in the United States in Texas in 2004 and was first found in Mississippi in the spring of 2004. It is now well established in several counties in Mississippi, including Rankin County. We need to know how to identify and control CMBS to help slow its spread and reduce its impact.

There are few natural enemies here in the United States, and this allows CMBS to build to unusually high numbers on infested plants. It is not unusual for heavily infested plants to have branches and twigs that are completely encrusted with scale. The nymphs produce large quantities of honeydew, and this results in heavy accumulations of sooty mold on the leaves, twigs, and trunks of infested plants, as well as on nearby low-growing plants and surrounding grass and mulch. The end result is a crape myrtle that is black and ugly (which is due to heavy sooty mold accumu-lation) and produces fewer and smaller blooms. Crape myrtles heavily infested with CMBS soon become a landscape eyesore. Effective treatments are available, but they are costly and do not provide 100 percent control. Treatments must be reapplied each year.

Sooty mold alone is not a definite indication of CMBS, but if you also find white, felt-covered scales that bleed pink when punctured, you can be certain you have crape myrtle bark scale. Heavy infestations can also cause trees to be covered with black sooty mold. Any Crape Myrtle that is covered with sooty mold, should be carefully examined

for CMBS. Trees can have heavy infestations of aphids and CMBS. Aphids will feed only on the leaves, CMBS will feed mainly on the twigs, branches, and trunk, and rarely on the leaves.

Heavy infestations of CMBS cause crape myrtles to be very unsightly. Simply ignoring and living with the problem may not be an acceptable option for most homeowners and landscape managers. Control options for CNBS fall into our major categories; Exclusion, plant selection, plant destruction, and insecticide treatment.

The simplest and most effective defense against CMBS is to avoid buying and planting infested crape myrtles. Work closely with the nursery where the plants are purchased to be sure plants are free of crape myrtle bark scale.

Because of their unique beauty and toughness, crape myrtles are widely used in southern landscapes. Now because of CMBS, landscape planners are encouraged to consider alternative species in the landscapes to increase plant diversity. This will help mitigate the risks



and adverse consequences of having to deal with heavy CMBS infestations.

The are times when total plant destruction may be the appropriate means of dealing with a CMBS infestation. An example would be when there are just a few infected plants and there is reason to believe that these may be the only infested plants in the landscape, community, city or region. In this case, it would be best to destroy these plants before the

disease can spread. This pest is so new that control programs are still being developed. Treatments that have been the most effective are soil applied systemic insecticides containing the active ingredients imidacloprid, imidacloprid + clothianidin, or dinotefuran. Foliar sprays containing the insect growth regulator products pyriproxyfen or buprofezin are also available as sprays.

Some of these treatments are commercial products, and homeowners are encouraged to seek assistance from licensed commercial applicators to control CMBS, especially when treating larger trees. The cost of products for homeowners is considerably higher than for professional products. Homeowners with large numbers of trees to treat should consider getting bids from commercial applicators. The cost difference between treating trees yourself and hiring a commercial applicator to treat CMBS may not be as great as you think.

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
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

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Pastor's Perspective: "God is always working"

I have previously mentioned that our family lived overseas for 12 years. In 2006, Melanie and I loaded up our 2 very young children and moved across the pond to another country. I was accept-

ing a sports related job. It was a perfect match for me based on my background and general love for all things sports. We loved the country and the people and expected to live there for decades, if not the rest of our lives. However, our expectation did not become our reality. We ended up moving from there to Cyprus, after only 3 years due to some security related

events. It was very difficult for us to leave, but we also knew that we couldn't stay. On the very first day in the office with my new job, I met a man from the very country that we had just departed. In addition to the local Cypriot people, Cyprus is home to many from other nationalities. However, I never would have dreamed to meet someone from this particular country. He wasn't only from that same country; we lived in his city and our house was less than a mile from his family's home. We hit it off immediately. Our families soon met one another and even though we have returned to Rankin County, MS, we have been close friends ever since. During our time in Cyprus, I was eventually brought onto the leadership of an interna-

tional church there. Before moving overseas, I had served on church staffs, but had never pastored. The experience in Cyprus helped prepare me for the role I have today. I share these bits of our history to illustrate the providence of God.

In John 5:17, Jesus says: "My Father is working until now, and I am working." God is always working in and around our lives. We may not always notice it in the moment, but when we look back on our lives, we can recognize His fingerprints all over the place. Our family grieved the move from our first country only to be welcomed to the next by a family from the very place we didn't want to leave. You can call it coincidence if you want, but I choose to recognize this as God's providence. He cares for us. He puts people in our lives to fill holes that the loss of others has created. He also uses our experiences to prepare us for what He has planned for us in the days ahead. Not only that, He redeems our hurts and struggles and uses them to either prepare us for something ahead or so that we can be a blessing to others that walk through similar situations that we have endured by His grace. If I had the space, I could write out stories from our history to illustrate each one of these truths.


